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### Christmas: What God's Coming Into the World Means for Us

"The saying is trustworthy and deserving of full acceptance, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners, of whom I am the foremost." (1 Timothy 1:15)

Paul describes himself as a sinner whom God saved. I would like to introduce you to another sinner. His name is Wilhelm Buntz and he is also known as the "Bible smoker." Quite literally, he smoked the Bible. In prison. How did that happen? Briefly, let me tell you his story, one step at a time.

Wilhelm Buntz grew up in difficult circumstances. His mother abandoned him as a baby, and his father sent him later to a children's care home. As a teenager, he hit a man with his car and killed him for which he had to serve a sentence in juvenile detention. Even after that, he repeatedly came into conflict with the law. He was repeatedly sent to prison.

He was described as a "serious criminal with a riot profile," which caused him to be placed in solitary confinement several times. He was not allowed to take anything with him. Except a Bible. He had insisted on this. Not because he was so religious or pious, but because the Bible had a hollow space that he had filled with tobacco. Whenever he wanted to smoke a cigarette, he would roll the tobacco into the remaining pages of the Bible.

However, he was in the habit of reading the torn-out page first. Over time, the text of Scripture got a hold of him. At one point, as he continued reading the Bible, he realized how God was telling him, "I am faithful like a loving father." Eventually, he turned in faith to the God who had already found him in prison. Buntz discovered, "Life with God is ... tough. Tough (yet) full of miracles."

After his time in prison, he found work in a home for blind people in Freiburg until his retirement in October 2017. To this day, he reads the Bible every day. His motto is, "We must plunder hell and populate heaven."

Christmas is the story of a baby who was also not accepted by his own people when he came into the world (see John 1:11). At Christmas, we naturally remember the birth of Jesus, God's only begotten Son. He was born into a dangerous world with a "riot profile" that is no less dangerous today.

What situation was he born into? The emperor in Rome initiated a census. This was necessary for taxing purposes and to know who is fit for military service (Luke 2). For King Herod, this baby Jesus was a thorn in his side. He wanted to get rid of his rival to the throne as "King of the Jews." Joseph learned of this plan in a dream, which is why the Holy Family fled to Egypt, whereas the innocent boys of Bethlehem perished (Matthew 2).

The beginnings of Jesus' life were difficult. He was threatened and persecuted. And yet we must not underestimate what this baby would one day do for us. Because at Christmas, God's only begotten Son Jesus came to us, as Paul said, "to save (us) sinners." Jesus came into the world to rescue us out of the hands of the devil, or - in the words of Wilhelm Buntz - to "plunder hell."

The birth of God's Son Jesus was necessary to free us from the forces of sin. In Jesus, God came into the world to transform it. It worked with Wilhelm Buntz. Why not with us too? This truly turns the birth of Jesus into a reason for joy, as the angel also announced it to the shepherds, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of

great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David, a Saviour, who is Christ the Lord" (Luke 2:10f).

### Weihnachten: Was Gottes Kommen in die Welt bewirkt

"Das ist gewisslich wahr und ein Wort, des Glaubens wert, dass Christus Jesus in die Welt gekommen ist, die Sünder selig zu machen, unter denen ich der erste bin." (1. Timotheus 1,15)

Paulus beschreibt sich als einen Sünder, den Gott selig gemacht hat. Ich möchte euch einen anderen Sünder vorstellen. Er heißt Wilhelm Buntz und wird auch der "Bibelraucher" genannt. Er hat die Bibel geraucht. Im wörtlichen Sinne. Im Knast. Wie kam es dazu? Also, der Reihe nach.

Unter schwierigen Verhältnissen wuchs Wilhelm Buntz auf. Seine Mutter hatte ihn als Baby ausgesetzt, sein Vater später ins Heim abgeschoben. Als Jugendlicher fuhr er einen Mann tot, wofür er eine Haftstrafe im Jugendarrest absitzen musste. Auch danach kam er immer wieder mit dem Gesetz in Konflikt. Immer wieder kam er ins Gefängnis.

Man hat ihn als "Schwerkriminelle(n) mit Randaleprofil" beschrieben, was dazu führte, dass er sich wiederholt in Isolationshaft befand. Außer einer Bibel durfte er dorthin nichts mitnehmen. Darauf hatte er bestanden. Nicht weil er so gläubig war, sondern weil die Bibel mit einem Hohlraum versehen war, den er mit Tabak gefüllt hatte. Wann immer er eine Zigarette rauchen wollte, rollte er den Tabak in die übrig gebliebenen Bibelseiten ein.

Jedoch hatte er die Angewohnheit, erst einmal die ausgerissene Seite zu lesen. Mit der Zeit packte ihn der Text. Irgendwann wurde er gewahr, wie Gott ihm durch die Lektüre der Bibel mitteilte: "Ich bin treu wie ein liebender Vater." Schließlich wendet er sich dem Gott hin, der ihn ja schon im Gefängnis gefunden hatte. Buntz merkte, wie er sagte: "Das Leben mit Gott ist … knallhart. Knallhart (und) voller Wunder."

Nach seiner Gefängniszeit arbeitete er bis zu seiner Rente im Oktober 2017 in einem Blindenheim in Freiburg. Bis heute liest er jeden Tag in der Bibel. Sein Motto lautet: "Wir müssen die Hölle plündern und den Himmel bevölkern."

Weihnachten ist die Geschichte eines Babys, das ebenfalls nicht von den Seinen angenommen wurde, als es in die Welt kam (siehe Johannes 1,11). An Weihnachten erinnern wir uns natürlich an die Geburt Jesu, Gottes eingeborenen Sohn. Er wurde in eine gefährliche Welt geboren, mit "Randaleprofil", die heute nicht weniger gefährlich ist.

In welche Situation wurde er hineingeboren? Der Kaiser in Rom ließ eine Volkszählung durchführen, was zur Besteuerung der Bevölkerung aber zur Erhebung der Wehrfähigen im Militär nötig war (Lukas 2). Für König Herodes war dieses Jesus-Kind ein Dorn im Auge. Er wollte den Konkurrenten auf den Thron als "König der Juden" aus dem Weg räumen. Im Traum erfuhr Josef von diesem Plan, weswegen die Heilige Familie nach Ägypten floh, die unschuldigen Knaben von Bethlehem aber leiden mussten (Matthäus 2).

Die Anfänge von Jesu Leben waren beschwerlich. Er wurde bedroht und verfolgt. Und doch dürfen wir nicht unterschätzen, was dieses Baby einmal alles für uns tun sollte. Denn an Weihnachten kam Gottes eingeborener Sohn Jesus zu uns, um, wie Paulus es sagte, uns "Sünder selig zu machen". Jesus kam in die Welt, um uns aus den Fängen des Teufels zu entreißen, oder, in den Worten von Wilhelm Buntz, "die Hölle (zu) plündern".

Die Geburt von Gottes Sohn Jesus war nötig, um uns von unserer Sündenschuld zu befreien. Gott kam in Jesus in die Welt, um sie zu verwandeln. Mit Wilhelm Buntz hat das geklappt. Warum nicht auch mit uns? Jesu Geburt ist wahrlich ein Grund zur Freude, wie es auch der Engel den Hirten verkündet hatte: "Fürchtet euch nicht! Siehe, ich verkündige euch große Freude, die allem Volk widerfahren wird; denn euch ist heute der Heiland geboren,

welcher ist Christus, der Herr, in der Stadt Davids" (Lukas 2,10f).

Ich wünsche euch eine besinnliche Adventszeit und eine fröhliche Weihnacht, Björn E. Meinhardt, Pfarrer

Even in the short months since Jerry Roehr was able to visit the school, development seems to continue at a fast pace; here are some of the highlights.

Just as in Canada, parents should be involved in their children's education. Here are a couple of parent/teacher meetings.



Previously, we showed the finished (empty) state-of-the-art lab. Now, most of the lab equipment has arrived. Teachers and students are happy to assemble the equipment.







The stable food is nsima, a patty made from cornmeal. Cassava is also used, and as part of diversifying, Kuwala is also experimenting with potatoes to swap for rice, which is very expensive. A few months ago, the school purchased some moringa tree seeds (apparently costly), which are known to be heat and drought-resistant and are not affected by any severe diseases. The trees will be used for their vegetable leaves.



We have a video that shows the additional farmland that was purchased around our 'green' school campus. It will produce vegetables for the school and for sale. The work is done by hiring local farmers and not by students except for teaching purposes.

As you can see, there is a new addition to farming. As Malawi is primarily a farming community, teaching agriculture and animal care is an essential aspect of education.

**North American Lutheran Church.** Bishop Dan Selbo, in his weekly video on Friday, November 7, 2024, addressed the recent 2024 American elections and the upcoming 2025 Canadian federal election. Bishop Dan emphasizes the importance of grounding our lives in God's steadfast love amidst the political tides. As we approach Christ the King Sunday and the Advent season, Bishop Dan encourages us to stay rooted in faith, offering peace and compassion to a world in need.
